## STATE MEDICAID FACTS

## **Protect Your Healthcare, Schools and Hospitals**

The U.S. Senate is moving to approve **\$800 billion in cuts** to Medicaid that have already passed the U.S. House of Representatives. The bill will also end Affordable Care Act coverage for millions, allow out-of-pocket healthcare costs to increase, and cut Medicare spending by \$500 billion. Overall, 16 million people will lose healthcare, with 551,000 individuals dying unnecessarily each year.<sup>313</sup>

The bill will cause **34,000 people in Mississippi to lose coverage from MississippiCAN** (the state's Medicaid program).<sup>314</sup> Mississippi will lose \$3,006,000,000 in Medicaid funding.<sup>315</sup> That money could be made up through firing public service workers, raising your taxes by more than 5%, or reducing funding for schools and law enforcement.



In Mississippi, 518,360 people are supported by Medicaid.<sup>316</sup> This includes 57% percent of moms giving birth,<sup>317</sup> 49% percent of children<sup>318</sup> and 74% percent of grandparents and other seniors in nursing homes in Mississippi.<sup>319</sup> Medicaid also supports veterans, students, working families and AFT members.





School health professionals, like speech pathologists, occupational therapists and school nurses and psychologists, all rely on Medicaid funding. Without Medicaid, they will not be able to help as many of the 69,000 students in Mississippi schools with disabilities.<sup>320</sup>



Medicaid accounts for 19 percent of all payments to hospitals nationwide.<sup>321</sup> Cuts **could lead to longer wait times, rushed care, hospital closures** and an increase in workplace violence and other challenges faced by our healthcare members. Rural areas and small towns could be impacted the worst, with families having to travel hours for maternity or cancer care.<sup>322</sup>



Mississippi receives \$5,371,000,000 in federal Medicaid funding annually.<sup>323</sup> Gutting Medicaid will mean **job losses**—in hospitals, in schools and to Mississippi public service jobs.

We're in this fight together. Bipartisan groups representing state legislators, state governments, county managers and cities are concerned about the fate of Medicaid.<sup>324</sup> And 71 percent of voters who supported President Trump oppose cuts to Medicaid.<sup>325</sup> We need you to tell the political leaders and donors in Washington, D.C., to keep their hands off of MississippiCAN:<u>www.actionnetwork.org/letters/medicaid-cuts-2025</u>
